## **UNEMPLOYMENT DIGEST**


The Information contained in this report is based on Claimant Count and Universal Credit figures rather than job seekers allowance.

Since 1996, unemployment has been measured as a count of the number of people claiming Job Seekers Allowance (JSA). However, the UK Government introduced a new benefit, Universal Credit, in May 2013 which has had a phased introduction across the country. The Claimant Count will now be a measure of all those in receipt of Universal Credit who are out of work, including income based JSA claimants. Contribution based JSA claimants will be measured separately.

JSA figures continue to be published, although they now form a subset of the new Claimant Count data, which the ONS believe to be the best measure of the number of people claiming unemployment related benefits.

The October 2016 claimant count figures were released on 16<sup>th</sup> November 2016.

As illustrated by the chart below, the Highlands and Islands continues to have lower unemployment than either Scotland or the UK - a trend which has been fairly constant since the recession.




In October 2016, the average claimant count and universal credit unemployment rate for the 19 Travel to Work Areas (TTWAs) that comprise the Highlands and Islands was 1.5%, which was below the rates for both Scotland (2.2%) and the UK (1.9%). The region's rate was in-line with that of the previous month, but was higher than a year earlier (1.3% in October 2015).

The TTWAs whose rates exceeded the Scottish average in October 2016 were Dunoon & Rothesay (2.8%) and Alness & Invergordon (2.6%). Eleven TTWAs in the Highlands and Islands had rates in October 2016 lower than the Highlands and Islands average (1.5%) – Elgin (1.4%); Lochgilphead (1.2%); Oban (1.1%); Broadford & Kyle of Lochalsh, Fort William and Aviemore and Grantown on Spey (all with 1.0%); Portree and Ullapool (both with 0.9%); Shetland and Orkney Islands (both with 0.8%) and Mull & Islay (0.6%).

The total number of people claiming unemployment related benefits in the HIE area in October 2016 was 4,260. Out of the total, 890 were claimants aged 18-24.
